Field Trip: Ice Age Hydrology: Not a Drop Left to Drink.

The 28th annual Desert Symposium will be held at California State University's Desert Studies Center at Zzyzx, on the shores of Soda Lake south of Interstate 15 between Barstow and Baker, California. This historic site includes meeting rooms, overnight dormitories, catered meals, and showers: all these amenities are included with registration. This year's Desert Symposium is presented by the Desert Studies Consortium, California State University.

The 28th Annual Desert Symposium: Environmental Monitoring and Reconstruction.

The symposium organizers request presentations on current research in archaeology, history, paleontology, geology, ecology, biological sciences, and environmental issues. A proceedings volume will be published with the field guide, associated papers, and abstracts.

Student Awards

The Bob & Bobbe Adams Student Research Paper/Poster award is presented to the outstanding student presentation or poster (undergraduate/graduate students). The presentation must be a student as first author paper or poster. A cash award of \$50 is presented at the banquet.

Field Trip: Theme: "Ice Age Hydrology: Not a Drop Left to Drink

Day 1, SUNDAY: From Baker, drive dry lake to dry lake: south from Soda Lake on Kelbaker Road toward Amboy and Bristol Lake (saline). On Route 66, head east to Chambliss and jog south to Cadiz. Discuss Proterozoic & Paleozoic & Miocene rocks that have been rearranged by Mesozoic and Miocene tectonics. Standing near the irrigated orchards, discuss the current saline water of Bristol Lake and inferences of Pleistocene and Holocene freshwater flow through Fenner Gap. Drive toward Iron Mountain. Pass Cadiz brine playa, then Danby brine playa and salt extraction facilities. Discuss drill core records of past lakes, perhaps the Bouse lake system. Examine pediments around the margin of the Bristol - Danby Trough. Head southeast to visit paleosols in Chuckwalla Valley that have produced Ice Age fossils then Desert Center. Obtain food from Indio Markets and camp nearby. Driving distance Day 1 = 220 miles.

Day 2, MONDAY: Water in the Salton Trough occurs as springs, many along active faults, ephemeral streams, and the saline Salton Sea. Proceed along the east side of the Salton Trough and follow springs and sediments contorted by the San Andreas Fault (Durmid Hills, Salt Creek and Bertram Siding). Examine outcrops of the late Pleistocene Brawley Formation and its fossils that indicate lacustrine, fluvial and delta sediments associated with the ancient Colorado River deposits that preceded late Pleistocene Lake Cahuilla. Near Niland, discuss the status of Mullet "Island" and visit fumaroles and Red Hill steam vents. End trip in the Brawley Formation of the Superstition Hills. Driving distance Day 2 = 100 miles.
